2nd International Conference: Developing a Green Jobs Assessment Training Package

14 - 16 April 2015

ILO, Geneva

The Green Jobs Assessment Institutions Network (GAIN) was initiated in 2013 as a network of policy research institutions and experts for assessing employment-related effects of greening policies and promoting institutional and capacity building in developing and low-income countries.

The GAIN conference in December 2013 concluded that the next objective of GAIN is to formulate a capacity building strategy with two subsequent goals:

- to develop and provide a **Green Jobs assessment training package** that systematically trains, teaches and assists GAIN members in undertaking Green Jobs assessments
- to institutionalize capacity building through relevant **regional hubs** that would serve as a **delivery platform** of training to practitioners (e.g. researchers and policy makers) in the area of Green Jobs assessments.

The 2015 GAIN conference will bring experts from various relevant fields together, to present and discuss draft training modules that would form a training package for Green Jobs assessments. These modules consist of Green Jobs Assessment Models (GJAM) such as Input-Output and Social Accounting Matrix models that have been employed in various countries. While GAIN has a focus on greening policies and climate change, it is important to note that these models can also shed light on the impacts on employment, income, fiscal and trade balances of a range of other policies, including infrastructure investment, public procurement or the creation of social protection floors. The benefits from increased capacity to carry out policy analysis with these models will thus extend far beyond Green Jobs.

Objective

The objective of this conference is to provide an opportunity for GAIN members to:

- review the experience with the application of models for policy analysis and their ability to inform policy making
- present, review and discuss draft modules of a Green Jobs assessment training package by processing feedback and inputs to the materials currently under development
- discuss the delivery of the Green Jobs training through regional hubs.

This second annual conference of GAIN will be structured in the format of a workshop, including panel discussions on experiences from experts using various GJAMS; presentation and review of the draft training modules; and discussion on ways forward to deliver training to GAIN members and other practitioners in the field of Green Jobs assessments. The content and methods that should be included in the training package will be finalized after the workshop based on the presentations and panel discussions during this workshop.
